THAT WHEREAS, the Lessee wants to lease from Lessor, and Lessor wants to lease to Lessee certain rights, privileges and/or space within and upon the Nebraska State Fair Grounds at Lincoln, Nebraska, during the term:

MARCH 27 and 28, 1982

plus "move in" commencing on March 26, 1982 and "move out" by March 29, 1982

IT IS THEREFORE AGREED between the parties that Lessor has leased unto Lessee the following privileges and/or facilities located on the Nebraska State Fairgrounds for the amounts indicated. Unless otherwise noted the rates are on per day basis.

AGRICULTURAL HALL - \$450.00 per day plus Utilities at cost

A MOVING IN CHARGE OF \$50.00 PER DAY PLUS ADDITIONAL UTILITIES USAGE AT COST APPLIES

For purpose of this contract the following rates shall apply for additional personnel and/or services provided none of which are included in the price above, unless indicated as such below.

NO EXHIBITS SOUTH OF WHITE LINE IN AGRICULTURAL HALL - FIRE MARSHAL'S ORDERS

As further consideration for the granting of privileges and use of the premises during the term of this lease, Lessee agrees to abide by and conform with all the terms and conditions set forth:

Lessee agrees that the privileges hereby granted will be conducted according to the rules and regulations of the Nebraska State Board of Agriculture and of the laws of the State of Nebraska and without infringement upon the rights or privileges of others, and Lessee will not handle or sell any commodity or transact any other business whatsoever upon and within the premises and Fair Grounds, except that which is herein expressly stipulated and contracted for and will confine transactions to the premises and privileges provided herein.

Lessee hereby gives to Lessor a lien upon all property being kept, used or situated upon the premises or upon said Fair Grounds whether such property be exempt from execution or not for the rent or privilege money to be paid under this contract and for any damages sustained for any breach thereof, and Lessor shall have the right to distrain the same without process of law and appropriate said property to the use of Lessor to satisfy all its claims against Lessee.

Lessee agrees to carry Public Liability Insurance including Products Coverage in the amount of \$ 100,000.00 Personal Injury for each occurrence and \$ 300,000.00 aggregate. The Property Damage Limit will be \$ 100,000.00

per occurrence and \$ 50,000.00 aggregate. Said insurance will be with an insurance carrier acceptable to the Lessor and will name the Lessor as an additional insured. Said insurance must be in full force and effect at all times when Lessee is making any use of or occupying in any manner the leased premises or carrying on any activities associated with or incidental to the use of the premises. Evidence of such insurance must be provided by delivering to the Lessor at its offices at the Nebraska State Fairgrounds in Lincoln, Nebraska, a certificate showing that said insurance is in full force and effect; such certificate to be returned with signed contract.

Lessor will assume no liability for injury to property or person or death of any person or persons on or about the premises Lessor will not be responsible for any damage to exhibits, merchandise, or concessions caused by thefts, wind, hail, fire or water or any cause whatsoever. Lessee covenants and agrees to defend at its own expense, indemnify and save harmless the Lessor from any and all liability penalties, damages, costs, expenses, causes of action and claims of every kind and nature arising from illness, death, bodily injury or property damage to any person whomsoever, occasioned by or growing out of or in any way connected with the occupation or use of the leased premises or activities associated therewith. The lessee must also provide lessor with exemption certificate on workmans compensation exempting lessor from any liability.

Neither this contract nor the privileges granted herein, can be assigned or otherwise disposed of without the written consent of Lessor.

No alteration or variation of the terms of this contract shall be valid, unless made in writing on the reverse side of this contract and signed by the parties hereto, and no oral understandings or agreements not incorporated herein and no alterations or variations of the terms hereof, unless made in writing and signed by the parties hereto, shall be binding upon any of the parties hereto.

A 50% deposit is required at time of signing.
All concession privileges including but not limited to food, drink, tobacco, liquor, beer and candies will be reserved for sale by the lessor or his agents. In addition the lessee cannot give away any of the above from the premises

If any outside space is used for exhibit, a minimum charge of \$25.00 per unit will be made by Lessor.
No exhibit shall be located on the grass without the written permission of the lessor.

Lessor, by its authorized agents and employees may enter upon the premises at all reasonable times to examine the conditions thereof, but shall not exercise the right in a manner to interfere unreasonably with the business of the Lessee.

Lessee will not commit waste on the premises and will comply with all applicable laws and ordinances respecting the use and occupancy of said building. Lessee agrees to repair any damage done during occupancy of said building and will surrender the premises to the Lessor in as good condition of repair as when received, ordinary wear excepted. Lessee has examined the premises and knows the conditions thereof and accepts them in their present condition.

Lessee will be responsible for Vandalism or destruction of Lessor's property during the term of the lease and must have a security guard on duty at all times.

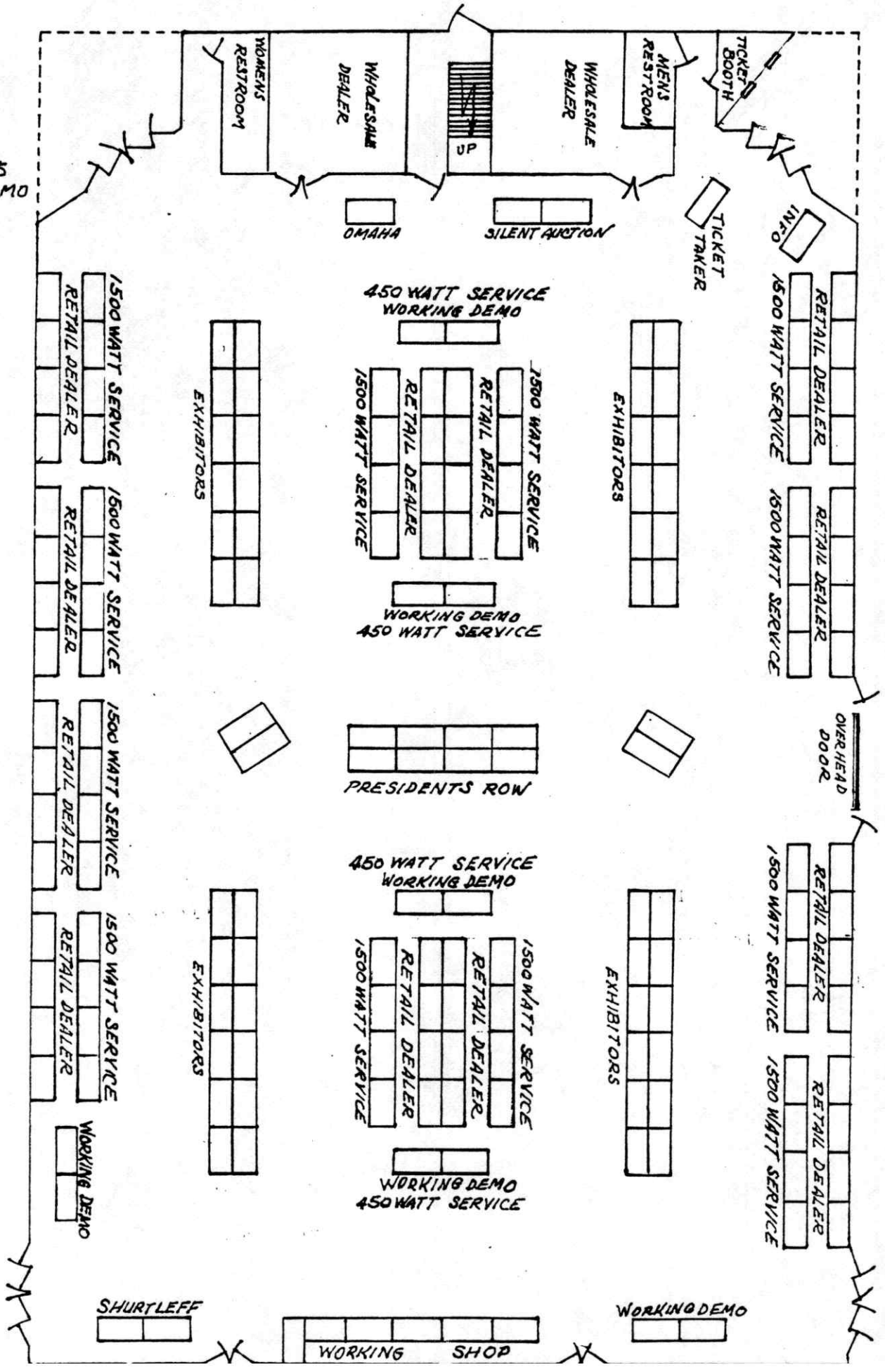

FOSSIL PLAQUES TO BE GEM AND MINERAL SHOW FEATURE

Blayde Keel, a 21 year old art major at the University of Nebraska will demonstrate the making of ceramic fossil plaques at the forthcoming 24th annual gem and mineral show to be held Saturday and Sunday, March 27 and 28, in the Agricultural Hall at the Nebraska State Fairgrounds. According to Roger Pabian, Associate Professor with the university's Conservation and Survey Division, the plaques are deceptively accurate reproductions of fossils. When the paleobiology gallery of the State Museum needed an example of an extremely rare form of a fossil trilobite, Keel was called upon to produce it, and the fossil plaque now fills an important educational function. Keel indicates that he has been making the fossil plaques for nearly 2 years. To date he has produced about 20 varieties of fossil reproductions. Each plaque takes from 1 to 3 hours to construct, and another 16 hours of firing in a kiln are required to complete the plaque.

A rock-hound robot will tour the aisles of the show and bring electronic age answers to questions posed by fledgling rockhounds. The robot was constructed by David McCartney of Grand Island, a student at the Southeast Technical Community College, Grand Island Campus. McCartney is studying electronics and is the son of Grand Island rockhounds, Connie and Mary McCartney.

Program chairman, John Abel, has indicated that there will be a full slate of illustrated lectures and films for the entertainment and education of show visitors. Films include "Blowout," produced by Chapparal Industries of Denver. The film deals with the Red Adair company of Houston and its experiences in dowsing a large oil well fire in Wyoming. "Gems of the Americas," a film produced by the Gemological Institute of America will also be previewed at the show. Roger Pabian will present a lecture on appraising and evaluating specimen and museum quality agates. Hal Horak of Omaha will also present an illustrated lecture on the copper mining country in the Keweenaw Peninsula of Michigan.

Working demonstrations at the show will include Mr. and Mrs. Dan Finch of Des Moines, who will produce Indian Sand Bottles; Cliff Eickhoff of Norfolk will make beads; Stan Shurtleff of Humboldt, Nebraska, will make agate marbles; Bev Carroll of Fort Dodge, Iowa, will make rock pictures; Art Henry of Plattsmouth will do painting on rock slabs; Martha Thorpe of St. Joseph, Missouri, will make rock creatures; and Bill Butterfield Of Lincoln will chip arrowheads from rock.

There will be a complete working shop with jewelry making and gem cutting demonstrations. Some members will work with rock carving equipment and do such things as drill holes in rock.

Displays of interest will include amber and a large 18 inch long selenite crystal. There will be a display of cameo carved plates and cases of sand plaques and jewelry. The amber is furnished by Latvian residents of Lincoln. The plates are from the collections of C. S. Morris of Dubuque, Iowa, and sand plaques and silver jewelry from the collections of Mr. and Mrs. Dan Finch of Des Moines. Hal Horak of Omaha will have an outstanding display of copper crystals from the Keweenaw Peninsula of Michigan, and cases of Fairburn and Tepee Canyon agates from South Dakota.

There will be twelve retail dealers at the show representing 6 states, including Iowa, Nebraska, Kansas, Minnesota, Oregon, and Idaho. The dealers will stock complete lines of rough gems, cut stones, finished jewelry, lapidary equipment, gem cutting supplies, jewelry makers tools and equipment, minerals, crystals and fossils. The needs of the entire scope of the hobby will be well served.

There will be many individual displays provided by members of Lincoln Gem and Mineral Club and gem and mineral clubs in neighboring communities. These displays will include lapidary, jewelry and metalcraft, fossils, minerals, and items of geological interest.

The show opens at 9AM and runs until 9PM on Saturday and hours are from 9AM to 5PM on Sunday. Admission for adults is \$1.00 and children is 50 cents. There is ample free parking and food service is available in the building.

The club will host an awards breakfast Sunday morning and Janet Wright of Lincoln, a graduate student in geology at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln, will receive a Lincoln Gem and Mineral Club Scholarship.

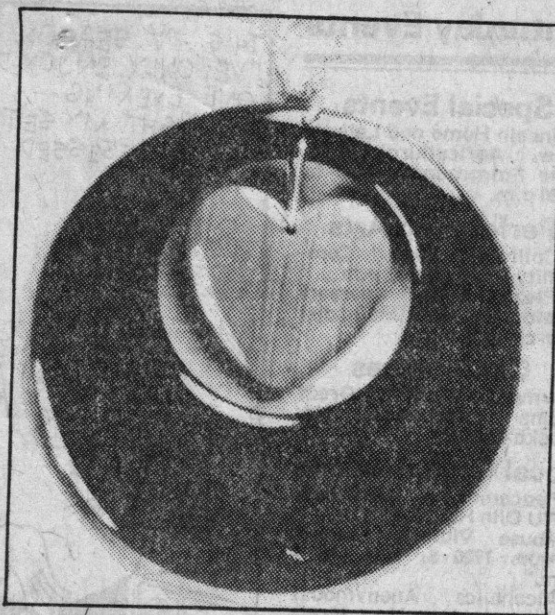

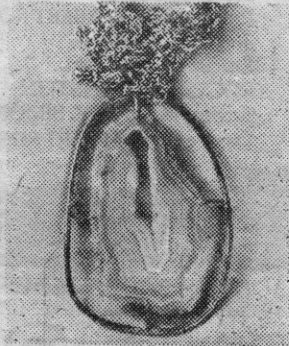

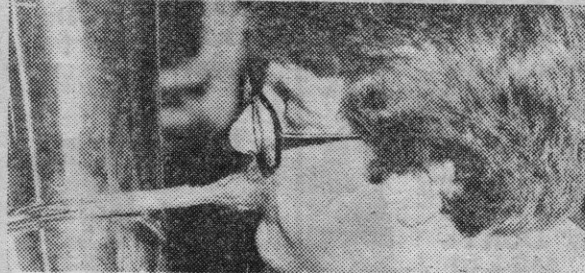
