GEMSTONE CARVINGS, PROGRAMS TO HIGHLIGHT 27th ANNUAL GEM AND MINERAL SHOW

Composite carvings made from various gemstones will be the featured display at the 27th Annual Gem and Mineral Show sponsored by Lincoln Gem and Mineral Club. The show will be held in the Agricultural Hall on the Nebraska State Fairgrounds Saturday, March 16, from 9:00AM to 8:00PM and Sunday, March 17, from 9:00AM to 5:00PM.

The gemstone carvings are the product of Frances Latimer of Cassville, Missouri. Ms. Latimer has exhibited her works twice before in Lincoln, at the 1974 and 1980 National Gem and Mineral Shows. Among Ms. Latimer's more famous carvings are the "Watermelon Man" and "The Old Musician." The latter was shown on the cover of the November, 1974, issue of Lapidary Journal Magazine, the first national magazine devoted to gem cutting and lapidary arts. Ms. Latimer studied at the Chouinard School of Art in Los Angeles. After World War II, she returned to Wichita, Kansas, where she was the staff artist for the Wichita Eagle-Beacon newspaper. In addition to exhibiting her carvings, Ms. Latimer will demonstrate how to carve gems.

The show will feature 12 retail dealers representing the states of Nebraska, Iowa, Colorado, Missouri, Illinois, Idaho, and Oregon. The dealers will stock a full array of supplies for gem cutters, jewelry makers, metal workers, and other related facets of the rock hobby. Their wares will include uncut rough as well as finished gemstones, silversmithing supplies, rock saws, grinders, polishers, tumblers, findings, collecting equipment, mineral crystals, fossils, finished jewelry, clocks, carvings, beads, marbles and hundreds of other items to supply the needs of the gemstone enthusiast at any level of experience.

There will be many working demonstrations at the show. Barry Rose of Grand Island will demonstrate silversmithing, and his wife, Carolyn, will demonstrate the construction of gemstone trees.

Also from Grand Island are Connie and Mary McCartney. Connie will demonstrate the art of scrimshaw, where a picture is scratched in a medium and the scratches are filled with a contrasting colored ink to produce a picture. In earlier times, scrimshaw was done on the teeth of sperm whales, but the art is now carried out on such materials as bones or horns from cattle, guava nuts, fossil ivory from Alasks, or even plastic or old piano keys. Mary will show how to make steam castings from precious metals such as gold and silver.

Henry Mohnholt of Kearney will make stained glass windows and agate slab sun catchers as well as gemstone kaleidoscopes. Henry has actively pursued his glass work since retirement 5 years ago and he has become a very popular attraction at many of Nebraska's gem and mineral shows.

There will be 12 illustrated lectures at the show and these will cover a broad spectrum of the rock hobby. Leading off at 10:30, Saturday, will be junior member, Garen Miller, who will talk about Mesa Verde National Park in Colorado. Garen's program will be geared to the young rockhound and and any youth in Lincoln who are interested in rocks or geology are urged to see this presentation.

"Pohocco's Revenge" will be the topic of a program presented by Dr. Gilbert Leuninghoehner, Professor Emeritus of Midland College, Fremont, Nebraska. Dr. Leuninghoehner's lecture will be at 11:30AM Saturday.

At 1:30PM Saturday, David Nixon of the University of Nebraska State Museum, Lincoln, and the Trailside Museum at Fort Robinson, near Crawford, will talk about the Pine Ridge and Little Bad Lands of Nebraska. During the summer months, Nixon leads guided field trips through these areas and the trips are designed to familiarize the non-professional with the geology of that part of Nebraska.

"The Crystal Kingdom" is the title of the program to be given by Walter Erbach, Professor Emeritus of Engineering Mechanics of the University of Nebraska, Lincoln. Professor Erbach's slides are 3-D pictures of mineral crystals taken with special photographic equipment and projected with specialized equipment that he has developed especially for this purpose. Presentation time is 2:30PM Saturday.

At 3:30PM, Saturday, Don Johannes of Naperville, Illinois, will present a lecture on opals. This program has been very popular and is booked again this year to accommodate the many gem cutters who were unable to attend the SRO presentations in 1984.

At 4:30PM, Saturday, Jeff Uhrich, Nebraska Game and Parks Commission, and Assistant Superintendent of Ash Hollow State Historical Park in Garden County, will speak on the Historical Significance of this area. This same program will be repeated at 10:30AM Sunday.

Irl Everett will present his illustrated lecture on Carlsbad Caverns, New Mexico, at 7:00PM, Saturday.

After the close of the show on Saturday evening, there will be a dinner and awards ceremony. At that time, 4 graduate students in geology will receive scholarships from Lincoln Gem and Mineral Club. Three recipients are students at the Department of Geology at the University of Nebraska in Lincoln; these are: Richard Ehrman, Nene Sow, and Janet Wright. Lee Pivonka, Colorado School of Mines, in Golden, is the fourth recipient. Pivonka started his career as a junior member of Lincoln Gem and Mineral Club.

Show activities continue on Sunday morning, beginning at 9:00AM. Sunday is St. Patrick's Day and the activities will culminate with the judging of the best green rock contest. Show visitors on both days will be given ballots to vote on the best green rock displayed at the show.

Sunday's lectures also include "Ivory" by Don Johannes at 11:30AM. Bruce Koci, a researcher with the Polar Ice Coring Office at the University of Nebraska will speak about coring glacial ice in both the Arctic and Antarctic areas. Koci is one of the few people to have studied both polar regions.

Koci's program is scheduled for 1:30PM.

Roger Pabian, Conservation and Survey Division, IANR, University of Nebraska will speak on Moctezuma Agates from the state of Chihuahua in Mexico at 2:30PM Sunday, and the lectures will conclude with a program on the rocks of Newfoundland given by Nan Lindsley-Griffin of the Department of Geology, University of Nebraska-Lincoln.

Some 100 individual displays by members of Lincoln Gem and Mineral Club and other gem and mineral clubs in Nebraska will round out the show. The displays will consist of hand-made jewelry, carvings, minerals, fossils, agates, and many other gem and mineral products.

Admission prices for the show are: Adults, \$1.50; Students, \$1.00, with ID; Senior Citizens, \$1.00, with ID; Children, 50¢; children under 6 free with adult. Explorer, Boy Scout, Cub Scout, Girl Scout, Brownie, and Campfire groups will be admitted free on Saturday morning if in uniform and with an adult leader.

There is abundant free parking and food service in the building.

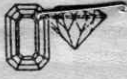

Gemstone carvings on display at 27th gem, mineral show

Composite carvings made from various gemstones will be the featured display at the 27th Annual Gem and Mineral Show from 9 a.m.-8 p.m. Saturday and 9 a.m.-5 p.m. next Sunday in the Agricultural Hall on the Nebraska State Fairgrounds.

The gemstone carvings are by Frances Latimer of Cassville, Mo. She has exhibited her works twice before in Lincoln, at the 1974 and 1980 National Gem and Mineral Shows.

Among Ms. Latimer's more famous carvings are the "The Old Musician," which was featured on the cover of *Lapidary Journal Magazine* in 1974.

From seven states

The show will feature 12 retail dealers representing Nebraska, Iowa, Colorado, Missouri, Illinois, Idaho and Oregon. The dealers will have supplies for gem cutters, jewelry makers, metal workers and other rock enthusiasts, and also uncut and finished gemstones, silver-smithing supplies, rock saws, fossils, jewelry, clocks and other items.

Demonstrators will include Latimer, gem carving; Barry Rose, silver-smithing; Carolyn Rose, gemstone trees; Connie and Mary McCartney, scrimshaw and steam castings from precious metals; and Henry Mohnholt, stained glass windows, agate slab sun catchers and gemstone kaleidoscopes.

"Pohocco's Revenge" will be presented at 11:30 a.m. Saturday by Gilbert Leuninghoehner, professor emeritus of Midland College, Fremont.

At 1:30 p.m. Saturday, David Nixon of the University of Nebraska

State Museum and the Trailside Museum at Fort Robinson will discuss the Pine Ridge and Little Badlands of Nebraska. During the summer, Nixon leads guided field trips through these areas.

"The Crystal Kingdom" will be presented by Walter Erbach, professor emeritus of engineering mechanics at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln (UNL), at 2:30 p.m. Saturday. The show will be 3-D slides of mineral crystals taken with special photographic equipment.

At 3:30 p.m. Saturday, Don Johannes will present a lecture on opals. At 4:30 p.m., Jeff Urich of the Nebraska Game and Parks Commission will speak on the historical significance of the Ash Hollow State Historical Park area in Garden County. This program will be repeated at 10:30 a.m. next Sunday.

Irl Everett will present a lecture on Carlsbad Caverns, N.M., at 7 p.m. Saturday.

Scholarships

At a dinner and awards ceremony Saturday evening, four graduate students in geology will receive scholarships from the Lincoln Gem and Mineral Club, sponsors of the show. The recipients are Richard Ehrman, Nene Sow and Janet Wright of UNL, and Lee Pivonka, Colorado School of Mines.

At 11:30 p.m. Sunday, Don Johannes will present a lecture on ivory. At 1:30 p.m. Bruce Koci will speak on coring glacial ice in both polar regions. At 2:30 p.m., Roger Pabian will discuss Montezuma Agates from Mexico. The lectures will conclude with a program on the rocks of Newfoundland by Nan Lindsley-Griffin.

Admission is \$1.50 for adults, \$1 for students with identification and senior citizens, 50 cents for children and free for children 6 and under. Explorer, Boy Scout, Cub Scout, Girl Scout, Brownie and Campfire groups will be admitted free on Saturday morning if in uniform and with an adult leader.
