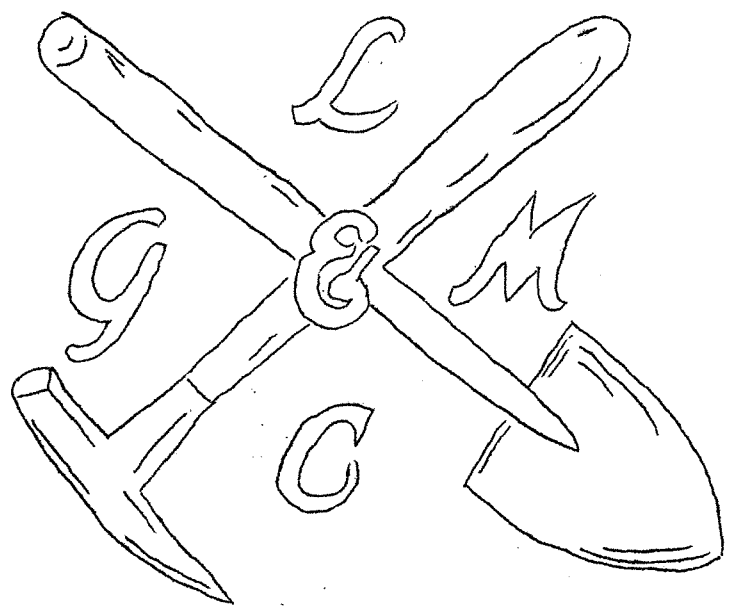

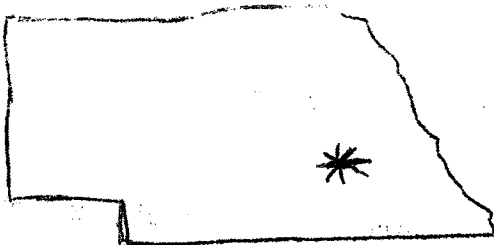

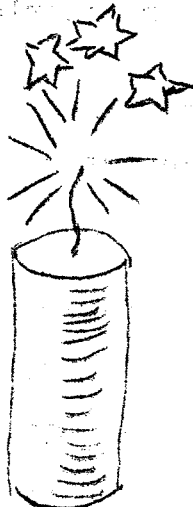

1. H--2½, vermillion-red to brownish-red, usually in fine granulated masses.
2. H--5-5½, L- glassy, dark brown or yellow, used to color paint.
3. H--5, usually green or brown, cleavage is poor.
4. L--transparent to translucent, cubic crystals, crystals cleavage easily.
5. L--greasy, waxlike or silky, crystals are unknown, H--2.
6. L--glassy or pearly, crystals form in groups, cleavage good.
7. L--brilliant, uncut crystals usually pale yellow or colorless, crystals are usually six or eight-sided.

THE ELUSIVE JADE ! !

We received a copy of the Prairie Rockhound from the Ogallala Club this month-renewed our thoughts of hunting jade and hope you will enjoy the reprint. Thank you Ogallala.

"Some of the members may be going to Wyoming during their vacation and might like to know that Platte County, Wyoming claims that there is no bad jade in Platte County. Most of the jade is found in the gravels in the vicinity of the Glendo Reservoir. Never hunt jade on a cloudy day. The jade is in the form of slick river or glacier worn pieces with a waxy-looking surface. On a cloudy day, you can't see the slick look to these jade "slicks".

Most all jade found in this county commands a price of at least \$10.00 per pound, or more. A small specimen weighing a pound or more of black jade, with the light green spots on the surface, may be worth \$25.00 per pound.

Not all that glitters is jade. If you are new at jade hunting break off a small chip, if it sparkles in the sun it is not jade, it may be diorite. Try scratching the piece with the point of a knife. If you can scratch it, it is not jade. Jade is heavy compared to a rock of similar size. Tap the rock with your hammer using the pointed end, if the rock shows a small moon-shaped fracture the rock is not jade. The rock must have a smooth, almost waxey, look to it to be jade. Good jade will not fracture from heat. Most jade found in this county has a brown coating on it. Still waxey, but brown, perhaps with bumps on it. To be more sure that it is jade tap a chip off and the color underneath will probably be black or green.

Many very good jade slicks have been found on the northeast end of the Glendo reservoir in a layer immediately above a red rock formation. Sides of hills that have been eroded are your best bet. New material is always coming into view.

A jade hunter from Colorado recently found some good slicks. One weighed 9 lbs. A man from Douglas, Wyoming, found an emerald slick weighing 8 lbs. and was an excellent piece and deserves a place in any museum.

The jade isn't plentiful so plan to spend at least 8 to 12 hours for each slick you will find. IT WILL BE WORTH IT. Permits to hunt on Glendo properties as well as information may be obtained at the Rock Museum offices at Wheatland, Wyoming.

In this same locality can be found White Stalactitic Agate, Scenic Seam Agate, Polka Dot Agate & Brecciated Jasper, as well as many others found on top of the hills. If you don't care to hunt and are in Wheatland do visit the Rock Museum, you will be glad you did. The owners have guided field trips to good collecting areas from time to time. The museum is one block west of the Courthouse."

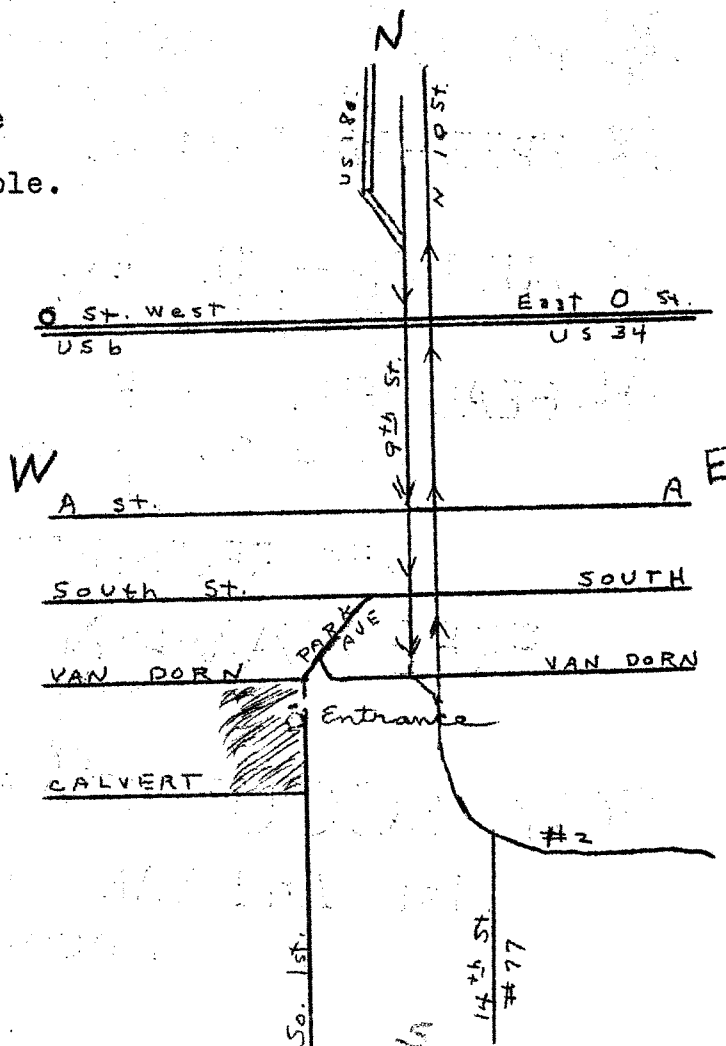

A FEW FINAL NOTES ON THE 1966 FIELD TRIP CONVENTION

We just received the May-June issue of the Earth Science magazine and in addition to the cover picture of a large Lake Superior agate the issue contains a wealth of material regarding Michigan's Copper Country. A big bouquet to the publishers, staff and contributors! This issue will be available at convention registration headquarters in June for those interested in a souvenir copy. By all means get one!

Registration forms were sent to all Midwest clubs on April 8th but unfortunately one package of 24 forms was returned with the address label missing. The club that failed to receive these forms should contact Dr. J. P. Dobell, c/o Michigan Technological University, Houghton, Michigan immediately.

Some questions have been received regarding parking charges for campers and trailers. There will be no charge for parking at Michigan Tech's athletic field. State parks however have a \$2.00 initial charge with a 50¢ per day camping fee. McLain State Park is located about 12 miles from Houghton on M203 and can handle about 100 trailers. No prior registrations. Calumet Waterworks Park about the same distance from Houghton can accommodate about 30. Running water and an agate beach on your doorstep here. No charge as of this date. Another trailer park is located one mile south of Houghton on U.S. 41. Prices for all convention events were listed on the registration forms. There are no additional charges on anything else.

As an afterthought I might mention two other items the Copper Country is noted for - Cornish pasties and Finnish saunas or steam baths. The

pasty is an individual meat pie (chopped meat, potatoes, turnips, carrots and onions) enclosed in pie crust. The copper miners find pasties convenient to take underground and they make an ideal meal to take on a field trip. You will find pasties on most every restaurant menu here. Try one, you'll like them.

The Finnish sauna was introduced to Michigan's Upper Peninsula about the turn of the century by people from Finland who settled here. It consists of a room heated by a cobblestone stove. Steam is generated by throwing water on the heated stones. The more hardy thrash themselves with switches made of cedar or birch boughs. To indulge in a sauna is a refreshing and relaxing experience guaranteed to take the kinks out of your body after a day of field trips. The Copper Country has a number of these public baths but unlike the old smoky saunas, these are modern brick buildings heated by gas and complete with showers.

We of the Copper Country Rock and Mineral Club hope most of you will be able to join us in June. If not, our door of hospitality is always ajar.
