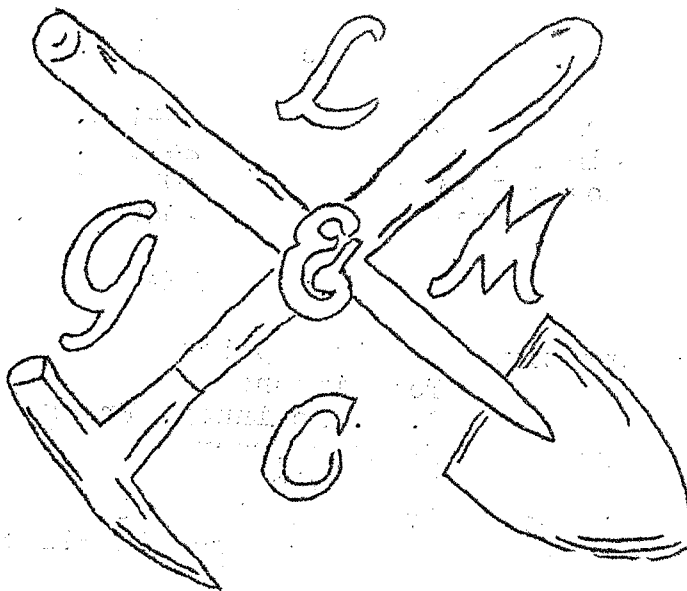

Midwest Convention Minneapolis, Minn. July 23 - 26, 1970

Robert Browning sang "oh, to be in England, now that April's there," but today he would have said, "oh, to be in Minneapolis, now that the big Midwest Federation show is there." The date is July 23 to 26, the place is the huge Convention Center right downtown in Minneapolis, and the host is the hardworking Minnesota Mineral club.

First, a bit about the program. Wednesday, July 22 is set-up day for exhibitors, and registration is Thursday - opening day - from 7 a.m. until 9:30 p.m. Competitive exhibits will be judged that day. Friday, July 24, will open with a dealers' breakfast at 7:30 a.m., a bulletin editors' brunch and meeting at 8:30 a.m., a judges' luncheon at 12:30 p.m. and the meeting of the executive committee at 4 p.m. and dinner for the committee members at 6 p.m. Saturday will include the federation council's meeting at 10 a.m. and ending at 4 p.m. and the banquet in the evening at 6:30 p.m. with Jay Wollin, first vice president, as speaker. This will be the day for science fair winners to be honored and for many of their classmates to see the show. Sunday will start with a breakfast at 9 a.m. for the Rolling Rock Club and end with closing of the show at 6 p.m. Doors will open at 10 a.m. each day and close at 9:30 p.m.

Professional security guards will assure the safety of the exhibits and of those who attend the show. Display cases will be furnished only for competitive exhibits.

The Convention Center is so well equipped and so large that all activities, including lectures, special demonstrations, cafeteria service and even the banquet will be handled within its walls.

A major theme of the jewelry and special exhibits will be oriental displays in keeping with the close association of the convention with Minneapolis' major summer fun week, the Aquatennial celebration.

Visitors to the show will have a chance to see its elaborate parades and other events, including the presentation probably at the federation convention, of jade necklaces to the 60 visiting queens at the Aquatennial. A jeweler's modeling class will show off an extensive collection of diamonds, and the emerald and diamond Salvador Dali necklace and the painting from which it was made have been lent by their New York owner for the first public display. The Linde Star dress, a Smithsonian Institution collection of gem stones, and the jewelry creations of Christian Schmidt will be highlight of the special exhibits. So will the Lizzadro museum's gem-encrusted gold

elephant from Ceylon; the first display outside South Dakota of Margaret Erwin's superb Fairburn agates; the Virgil Hill Bola tree from Hot Springs, and the John Philipp Wild carvings from California. The list of special exhibits fills two pages.

It is planned to give free tickets to anyone who lends a four pound or larger Lake Superior agate for display at the show. So dig into the basement for a winner.

There are many hotels and other places to stay within a few blocks of the Convention Center, and for those who will be coming in campers a large area at Lake Independence and another at Shokapee on the Minnesota river will be made available. The latter has hookups, and bus service to the show will be provided from Lake Independence. There will also be a rock swap tent at Lake Independence.

All in all, it looks like a great show in summer vacation country that every Federation member will wish to attend. Make that wish come true by being there.

For those who wish to make a field trip in Minnesota following the convention, the State Tourism Department and the Hibbing Chamber of Commerce are planning an "Iron Range" Trail-Along" July 27 through August 1. Hibbing is about 200 miles north of Minneapolis, and the Mesabi Mineral and Gem Club has been assigned to provide tour guides for field trips into iron mines and to conduct swap sessions. Arrangements may be made at the convention or by writing the Hibbing Chamber of Commerce.

JUNIOR ACTIVITIES TEXT

To assist clubs that wish to get a Junior Activities program started, Earth Science, official publication of the Midwest Federation, has just completed publication of a book, The Young Idea by Jay E. Farr. Mr. Farr has been conducting an earth science program for Juniors for the past ten years. The book is dedicated to beginners in the study of rocks and minerals. The Young Idea consists of a series of nine talks for Juniors which can be used as a Junior course of instruction.

Junior members join a club because they want to learn more about the earth sciences. There is much to be taken into consideration to achieve this goal, such as:

1. A Junior member needs to be motivated.
This means helping boys and girls see things about their hobby that make it interesting, make it attractive, and make it meaningful.
2. A Junior want to improve.
If a youngster realizes he can improve, he will want to learn a new idea or skill.
3. A Junior needs some guidance.
It is important that proper guidance be given to Junior members to enable them to benefit from their activities within their club. Many clubs have study groups on various phases of our hobby. When a Junior study group is formed, certain things should be taken into consideration.
 - a. Help Junior members to set realistic goals.
 - b. Use rewards - praise members for doing a good job. Appoint them to committees or give them responsibilities which they can handle.
 - c. Involve Junior members in making decisions.
 - d. Present information in an interesting and novel manner. This will help to arouse a Junior's curiosity and interest. Most of us enjoy variety in life.
 - e. Inform Juniors what is expected of them and how you plan to proceed in teaching the project.
 - f. Make frequent reference to and draw on a Junior's experience, knowledge and abilities.

A copy of The Young Idea has been sent to each club in the Midwest Federation. Properly used this book can be extremely useful in furthering our Junior Activities Program. It should also prove to be of great value to members helping with earth science programs in schools, Girl Scouts, Boy Scouts, 4-H Groups and other such organizations. EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING

Communication was a key word at the meeting April 11 of the Midwest Federation's executive committee in Iowa City, Ia. Much of the discussion and many of the committee and state director's reports were concerned with informing the 215 clubs with 15,422 members about federation actions, publications and programs and with getting a feedback from the clubs about their needs and problems.

Fortunately, among the more than 80 attending the all-day meeting were representatives of a number of Iowa clubs who took a lively part in the discussion and presented their views and experiences.

To improve communication, the executive committee authorized use of the address of the federation secretary, Miss Jean Reynolds, 107 Tuttle Ave., Clarendon Hills, Ill. 60514, as the federation mailing address. Since the liaison officer in each club is charged with communicating federation business to his fellow members, ways of improving the efficiency of this office were brought up and several suggestions were received from attending club members. The dignity and importance of the office should be emphasized to make its occupant more effective, one person suggested, and another suggested calling on the liaison officer at each general meeting and board meeting for a report or a short talk on club-interclub-federation affairs. A third person suggested electing the liaison officer for a three-year term so that an inactive officer would not become fixed in the job.

As has been already reported by letter to the clubs, the committee decided to conduct competitive judging of exhibits at the 1970 Federation convention in Minneapolis July 23-26 under the rules in effect since 1967 because the new rules adopted last summer at the American Federation convention in Salt Lake City have not been received in time to permit judges and exhibitors to acquaint themselves with them.

Making the newsletter of greater usefulness to club members was also discussed, and some excellent suggestions resulted. The Newsletter now has a circulation of 11,000 copies monthly.

Mary Cornwell, editor of Earth Science, announced that as of August 1 subscriptions will cost \$3.00.

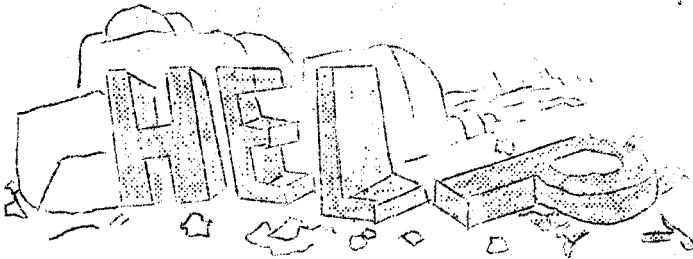
