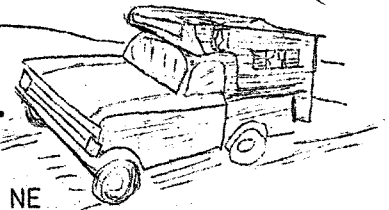

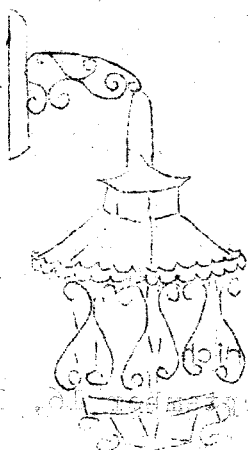

I HAVE BEEN TO ANOTHER NATIONAL SHOW

We were about four hours drive from Charlotte, at a rest stop. Marle was in a telephone booth and had asked the operator to connect her with the 1973 National Show headquarters. Within a minute she was talking to Al Lewis, the general chairman. I was busy writing a note in my 1974 file - "be sure to provide a telephone and a paging system." This was the beginning of a long series of notes taken during the show as I learned more and more about this great event.

I attended this National Convention and Show primarily as Federation Liaison Representative and it was time well spent. I met with AFMS and MWF leaders both formally and casually. We have worked out many of the fine details and agreed to the meeting dates and times. I am certain we will need to cover some more details when we meet in Cincinnati, Ohio in July. It is such a pleasant event working with those friendly, mature and wise people. I detected a keen sense of participation and personal involvement as we developed the plans. They are really supporting this 1974 Show effort.

We should be aware that we are also hosting a convention of delegates for the AFMS and the MWF during the show. Some more notes; "be sure to have ballots prepared for the delegates meetings", "Lee Kirby and Mary Anderson each need our stamp 'The Place to go in '74' for their correspondence". "Provide reception for officials one to one-and-a-half hours before the Awards Banquet" "The ladies need to have skirting on the head tables for modesty". "Have a mini-bus to transport people from the Convention Center to the Show area." "Three 8-ft. table at the banquet for the trophies." The notes go on and on which convinced me that attendance at federation shows is very necessary for anyone who is involved in planning on conducting a National Show and Convention. So many many people expressed their support and enthusiasm and I really wished that every member of LGMC could have been there to share those sentiments - It is very stimulating.

I also overheard some suggestions and received others from the friendly and helpful Charlotte Gem & Mineral Club members. To mention but a few; enclose a small map of the city with the show area clearly marked on it in the information packet. If you have unused display cases on tables remove them from the floor. Those chairs placed in the cross aisles are sure a welcome treat for tired feet. Have copious amounts of arrows and signs to guide people throughout the show area. This is important because hardly anyone can see everything in the short time available so they must pick and choose. A small 8½ x 11 map of each building is very much desired. These are typical suggestions and these items were provided by the Charlotte club for this show.

I also attended the delegates meeting of the Eastern Federation on June 29th. I noticed a great deal of enthusiasm and participation as they proceeded to settle or resolve the many issues before them.

I spent a few hours in the Nebraska booth which was strategically located near the center of an outside wall. I enjoyed those few hours because the enthusiasm others have for our Midwest show seems to build as we talk about it. I began to feel that at least half of the people had learned something from the booth and were now thinking Nebraska in '74.

I am impressed with the southern hospitality and I am sure it made the show experience much more rewarding. I particularly appreciated the consideration shown to us by Al Lewis, Elsie Ritch, and Bob Quinn. Each show is different and unique as this one was. It was unique for me because I gained much valuable information about conducting a national show.

My first trip to the southeastern part of the United States has just 'happened' - a good trip to a good show - the National Gem & Mineral Show - "Gemfest '73". I accompanied Marie Wells (publicity and "propaganda minister") and helped her man the LGMC booth in promoting the National Gem & Mineral Show in '74 right here in Lincoln.

The trip down through the Great Smokey and Blue Ridge Mountains was uneventful travel-wise in spite of the added 1000 lbs. of advertising Lynn had stashed away in car-top carrier and trunk, and the beauty of those tree-covered, haze-burdened hills was something else! The foliage is so very heavy and one is aware of so many more species of tree, shrub, and plant life growing there, and then of course, there were the tobacco and cotton fields which are foreign to our part of the country.

I'm looking forward to visiting the MWF meeting and show at Cincinnati this month and know we will get more details finalized. Then, on to bigger and better things in our '74 Nat'l. Show plans. See you in Sept. with another report. Be ready then to really get going on the final phases of our Show. We want it to be something special to remember.

KOSTER SITE - The remains of prehistoric houses dating back 4500 years, possibly the oldest habitations yet discovered in North America, have been unearthed at the Koster archeological site in Southern Illinois, near Eldred, Illinois (50 miles north of St. Louis). It has become known as one of the most important archeological sites in N. America because it contains 15 or more stratified occupations, the earliest dating back 8,000 years, and because of the excellent preservation of remains such as seeds, nuts and bone. MINUTES 1974 STEERING COMMITTEE AND SHOW COMMITTEE May 17, 1973

Present were Steering Committee members Ralph Ulrich, Howard Taylor, Irl Everett; Directors and committee members Roger Pabian, Marie Wells, Bob Bainbridge, Marie Taylor, Don Lawson, Norma Miller, John Harrison, Ray Grabher and visitors Pat Lawson and Lynn Wells.

It was announced that the Steering Committee has completed its work and everyone will now work with the Show Director, Mr. Irl Everett.

Clarification of titles was made - Chairman is the presiding officer at a meeting who carries out wishes of a group. Director is the head or chief entrusted by group to carry out policies. Asst. Director helps the Director get work done, Co-Director is equal (to go out and make decisions.)

Announcement that Bruce Simon, as Finance Chairman of the Steering Committee will carry out budget and fiscal duties and can approve up to \$500, over must go to Steering Committee. Ray Grabher will keep all 1974 Show books. Submit your request regarding the 1974 Show to Ray who will refer to Bruce, who will then request the LGMC Treasurer to pay the bills.

Deadline for completion of committee activities is nine months from now or March 1, 1973.

Policy File discussed - way to change it is to go to Show Director Irl Everett and ask for change.

REPORTS--

Budget and Fiscal-Ray Grabher asked what category should building of cases come under for charging of expenses. Answer-Competitive and Non-Competitive, #10 - Motion by Howard Taylor, second Roger Pabian.

Secretary not present.

Publicity-Marie Wells mentioned requests for hats by outstate Nebraska people and suggested as inexpensive advertising-referred to Irl for decision. Marie also asked about notifying schools. Several suggestions made.

Recognitions not present - suggestion that more help needed here and Irl will follow up.

Dealers-Howard Taylor read copy of retail contract, discussion to insert words 'acting for Lincoln Gem & Mineral Club' where agreement reads "between the Steering Committee and, etc". 50 dealers are to be contacted and Howard has 158 applications.

Special Features-Marie Taylor received letter asking for gemstone carving entry-this is Roger Pabian's area of planning. Marie mentioned that she is working on Roy Rogers, Greer Garson, Red Skelton and other special lecturers.

Displays-Roger Pabian mentioned 3 types-competitive, Non-comp. and NAOESCI. Exhibitors advisory same set as used in previous National and Federation Shows will be on back of applications. Discussion held re non-comp. displays to be in place by 10 PM on June 12 unless notification is made our display director. Displays will be in all three buildings-A is Exhibition Hall, B is Grandstand, C is Coliseum. Exhibit applications will be available in different colors.

Registrations-Norma Miller has no questions right now.

Building & Sites-Don Lawson asked how much insurance will be required and was referred to contract with State Fair Board of which Irl Everett has copy. It was suggested that we hire help thru State Fair Board, also for their help to supply security. Will need at least 20 people to help set up. Don already has 3, 1 to head each building. Don doesn't want to be responsible for parking. George Balke has line on this.

Special Events-needs some reorganization and Irl says this is in the making.

Security-Bob Bainbridge said Wells Fargo had been contacted and help is \$4.10 per hour, they carry own insurance, men are bondable, armed, and can furnish what we need. Will need 7 men at 4.10 for set up day and 4 days of show- approximately \$4,000. Suggest ribbons for 'security' people. Question- wouldn't State provide staff on state property?

Irl Everett reported - Get on the ball - we need to go - he is asking more people to help on the committees. Read your policy files- bring your committees up to date. Steering Committee says we're on our own- Make no commitments except thru the director of your area, and don't rely on verbal commitments. We need firm commitments on features, judges, etc. Every division director should establish his own time schedule and Irl needs someone to work out schedule of different committees, information about camping, parking, persons to contact, etc. to answer phone for Irl.
