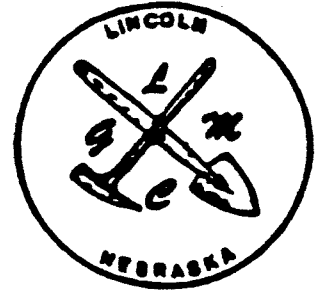

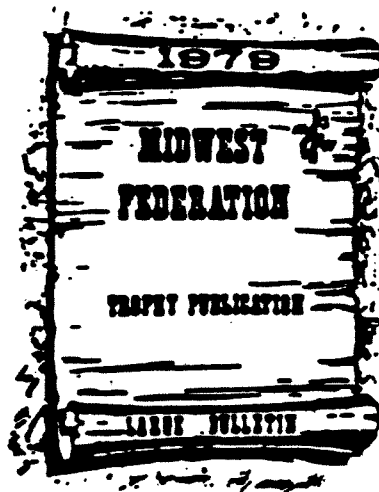

It was truly a program to remember.

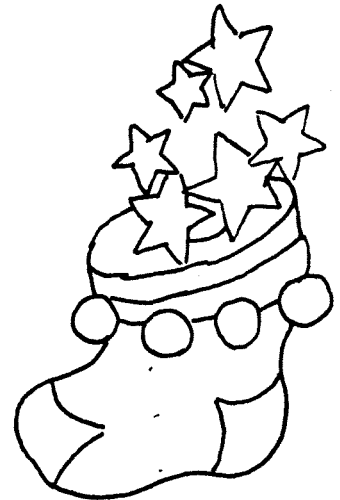

## Program &amp; Junior News:

A big thank you to Irl Everett for the slide program that he presented at the October meeting. Irl showed slides of the Grand Canyon with pictures from the rim as well as on the trails and down at the base of the canyon along the Colorado River. The views were spectacular! He also served up a double treat. Irl had brought along pictures of petrified wood in the form of huge logs from the Petrified Forest which is part of the Painted Desert. We really appreciate our members helping us provide programs and Irl always seems to have a good one tucked away.

Melissa Conner presented our November program. Melissa works for the National Park Service and is the Project Director for the Jackson Lake Project. This is a project to look for Indian artifacts around the perimeter of the lake while the waters were lowered for dam repairs. We first hear of this project two years ago at our January meeting and this program was an update. Melissa said that it will still be some time before all of the artifacts are analysed and final conclusions are made. She showed slides of areas where ancient firepits were found and excavated.

One of the areas that had more tools was on the delta area at the north end of the lake. Melissa said that no permanent dwellings were found and that the area seemed to be summer camp area (as many would think of it even today) and close to localities for collecting obsidian. The obsidian she said had a very sharp edge and was valued for trading. We found Melissa's talk very interesting and hope she will come back again to tell us the rest of the story.

The juniors will not meet again until the new year. Five juniors came to the Christmas Party. They all seemed to enjoy themselves. I have hear my own kids say they really liked the program especially the storytellers part. I was in Baltimore last month when the Pick and Shovel articles were due. ## CURATORIAL CURIOSITIES

Since there is no regular meeting in December, it is difficult to come up with a theme for my monthly diatribe. Nonetheless, there are a bunch of little items that could go to fill up a couple of pages of unrelated but interesting facts.

**MONGOL JEWELRY.** These fierce, nomadic warriors of the 13th and 14th centuries utilized large amounts of jewelry. Jade, agates, coral and turquoise were popular stones. Jade was commonly utilized only as tumbled slicks and was frequently attached to women's headdresses by glue. Many very fancy breastplates were made from agate and coral. It is of note that most of the coral used by the Mongols was of Mediterranean origin suggesting something about early trade routes. Fish and bats were frequently the motif of their jewelry. It appears that agate was very common in Mongolia. During the reigns of the great khans, it was permitted to surface collect agate; however, digging for it (or for any mineral resource) was a capital crime. (And we think the BLM is hard to deal with.)

**WHERE DID THEY GO? WHY DID THEY COME BACK?** There is a late Pennsylvanian age, flexible crinoid genus called Cibolocrinus. This odd little crinoid appears to have liked life in the deep, dark, cold ocean basins of the Pennsylvanian seas and it is quite common in northeastern Oklahoma and southeastern Kansas, only a few having reached Nebraska. Cibolocrinus all but disappeared from the North American midcontinent in the middle of the late Pennsylvanian and shows up sparsely in the latest Pennsylvanian rocks in Oklahoma and in the early Permian rocks of west Texas. It didn't show up again until the latest Permian rocks exposed on the Island of Timor in the far east---until the other day that is. While looking through some of the old invertebrate fossil collection in the museum research facility, a box of crinoid plates from the late Pennsylvanian rocks exposed near Dunbar, Nebraska, proved to be Cibolocrinus. Labeling error, I thought, until several more boxes, collected from the same area at different times by different people, also proved to be Cibolocrinus. Where did Cibolocrinus go during its long absences? Why did it come back to Nebraska in the latest Pennsylvanian when it never really cared for Nebraska before? These are the kinds of little mysteries that make paleontology so fascinating.

**NEW PUBLICATIONS.** Recently off the press is the Franklin County educational circular. It is available from the Conservation and Survey Division at the University for \$3.50. I will bring one for the club library to the January meeting. Also available are the DNAG field trip guides that were recently published by the Geological Society of America. My contributions to this series include Franklin and Webster county trips and a Ponca State Park trip that I did with Dennis Lawton. I have quite a few rerprints of the latter two trips and will bring copies of these to the January meeting for interested members. They are free. The entire DNAG field trip series would be a good investment for the club library. The series includes trips all over the United States. The sites are not geared for collecting as such, but toward showing geologic concepts. The cost of the whole set would be about \$300.00, but the north-central section should be acquired now.

**ROT, TRASH, NONSENSE DEPARTMENT.** Believers in the "New Age," euphemism for unadulterated occultism purport that quartz crystals are capable of healing illnesses, rechanneling your psychic energy, generating energy and all sorts of things. A recent program on ABC's 20/20 reported on quartz. It was a shabby done segment---all of the authorities they talked to were people involved in the sale of quartz crystals or associated paraphenalia. Not one of their witnesses was an unbiased observer who had nothing to gain from giving quartz a good report or nothing to lose from giving it a bad report. Sloppy journalism as such only enhances the medical quacks who at one time had to rely on sales of "revigorators" and "interocetors" to their unfortunate patients. These new-age quacks put profits above the welfare of their patients and in many cases the sufferer puts off obtaining quality medical care in exchange for false promises. One television sales show advertises quartz crystals for \$19.95 plus \$2.00 postage and handling. Similar crystals sell for about \$1.00 at rock shops. They talk of the energy that was required to make this crystal. The fallacy of their argument is that all of the energy has long left the crystal. The energy in the crystal is only that that is required to hold its atomic bonds together. That is precisely why a crystal is a crystal---the energy that kept it in a molten state in a magma or a lava has long since been dissipated. The energy in the crystal is not sufficient to break the atomic bonds that hold it together. Quartz does resonate when electric currents are applied to specific axes within the crystal, but the energy has to be supplied from an outside source. Whatever energy the quartz crystal has at any given time must be supplied in the form of electricity, heat, pressure or some other external force.

It has been established that beer comes in quartz, however. That fact cannot be disputed.

**COMPUTERIZED SHOWS.** Fred Holbert and I have been using our microcomputers to do much of the administrative work for the 1988 show. Such things as dealers contracts, cover letters, routine forms, and even the flyers have largely computer generated. The first show that I observed to be "fully-computerized" was the 1987 Midwest Federation Show at Dearborn, Michigan. The show administration appears to have flowed very smoothly and I brought some ideas back to utilize in our own show. I have not yet been able to get the computer to make a display, cover a table, sell a ticket, cut a cabochon, or do anything that the show visitor will see, except for setting the type for the show program. Sorry folks. We still need your displays and dedication for the show. The real beauty of the microcomputer is that I can do error-free typing without having to wait for correction fluid to dry.
