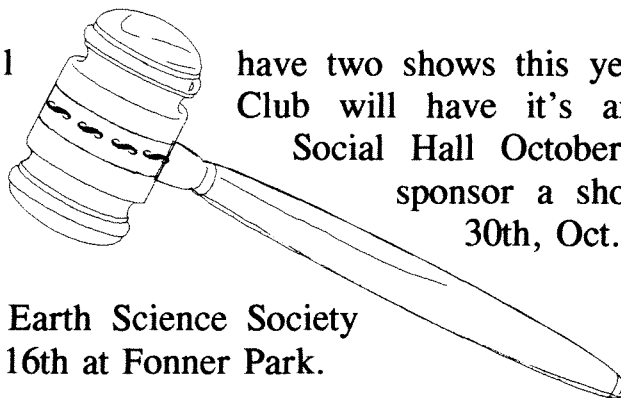

**Finding New Collecting Areas  
Part 10—More on using maps**

A Geologic map is one of the most useful tools to use when starting to search for collecting localities in a new area. This is especially true if the area to be considered is large. Use of a good geologic map will help locate the areas in which to start the search. If the objective of the search is a new agate "bed" the procedure might be as follows: Look in the map legend to find the symbol or color used for volcanic rocks (andesite, ash flow deposits, etc.). Start searching portions of streams passing through or around the edges of the volcanic rocks. Such a search could take many trips. It might be worthwhile to visit a few known agate producing areas before starting into the unknown. Generally the older more-weathered volcanic rocks offer the best bet.

For example if the objective of the search is mineral specimens of the Zeolite group the search would concentrate in the volcanic rocks, with emphasis on road cuts, canyons, quarries, etc.

The best chances of finding gem stones, such as ruby, emerald, garnet, topaz, and beryl, is to search in areas of metamorphic rocks (schist, gneiss, etc.). Many of the more resistant gems, such as topaz and ruby, can be collected in the gravels of streams that run through deeply weathered igneous and metamorphic rocks. Geologic maps of smaller areas will show pegmatite dikes, fault zones, and the contact areas between various rock types. All of these areas provide good possibilities. Locating and going to such an area should be more productive than just driving until you see something that looks interesting.

The first step for this type of search is finding the geologic maps. For the western states, Geologic Highway Maps, with several states to a map, are available from the American Association of Petroleum Geologists (P.O. Box 979, Tulsa, Okla. 74101) at a reasonable price. A letter to the Geological Survey, Bureau of Mines, etc. of the state(s) in which there is interest usually will produce a list of maps and/or publications available from that office. Many geological publications contain maps. Asking at a public library, university library, or university geology department may produce the needed maps.

Even when following the good directions that are given in a popular book describing collecting localities it is worth while having a county road map or topographic map. The writer experienced such a situation while looking for a frequently collected mineral locality in Colorado. The county road numbers had been changed after the directions were written. To complicate matters further one section of the road had been rerouted due to mining activities, which changed the mileage figures. As it ended the writer went about 1/4 mile past the desired locality and visited an area that fit the descriptions given. At least four other parties did the same during the next 2 or 3 hours. Advance preparation to visit this locality would have eliminated the problem. The writer had not originally planned to visit this site and had left at home another article that described the route. A collector should always take all the information about the area that is available when vacationing.

Many locations of mines, prospects or other features are given using Township and Range coordinates. An example would be NE 1/4 NE 1/4 Sec. 5 T4N, R1E. This appears, at first, to be a code designed to prevent anyone from locating the site. It is however a very precise method of locating things on a topographic map. The description above can be described as a location in the northeast quarter of the northeast quarter of section number five located in Township four North of Range one East. Assuming that you know what county and state the area is in, you can locate it on a topographic map within a square 1/8 of a mile (660') on a side. This accuracy should be good enough for you to find the prospective collecting spot.

A brief outline about land survey will help illustrate how it is used. At regular intervals across the country lines have been surveyed. The east-west lines are called Base lines and the north-south lines are called Range lines. Using these lines as a starting point the area is divided into squares, six miles on a side, which are called townships. The third township east of the Range line and just north of the Base line would be described as: Township one north, Range three east or T1N, R3E. As another example T5S, R10W would be 5 Townships south of the base line and 10 townships west of the range line. The side margins of a topographic map will have the township notations (T13N etc) and the range notations (R5W etc) for that map will be shown on the top and bottom margins. Each township is divided into 36 one-mile squares or sections. These sections are numbered 1 through 36 starting in the upper right hand corner. Once the desired section is located use a pencil to lightly divide it into quarters and then divide the quarters into quarters until you have fulfilled the requirements of the description. Some states such as Texas have areas that were originally surveyed using a system other than Township and Range. Consideration of topographic maps of the area combined with the description should allow you to find the prospective collecting site.

U.S. FOREST SERVICE PROMISES TO REVISE PROPOSED RULES TO SATISFY  
ROCKHOUND CONCERNS

Responding to comments from over 2500 fossil and mineral collectors, the U.S. Forest Service has publicly promised to change its final rules to allow for the collection of invertebrate fossils, rocks and minerals without a permit for "non-commercial, private or hobby purposes." See pages 2 and 3 of the "Questions and Answers for Proposed Rule, 36 CFR Parts 261 and 262," drafted by the U.S. Forest Service for use by its employees, enclosed. In a telephone conversation on May 12, 1994, Kathryn Toffenetti, in the Office of General Counsel of the U.S. Forest Service, informed me that Jack Ward Thomas, Chief of the U.S. Forest Service, has decided to rewrite the proposed rules in response to comments received from the public and to publish the rewritten rules as "proposed" rules in the Federal Register for further comment. The process of rewriting the rules has not yet begun and Ms. Toffenetti speculates that the rewritten rules will be published no earlier than the end of this summer.

Courtesy of A. Dean Richardson, RMFMS representative and President of the Utah Federation, I have in hand a copy of a letter to Jack Ward Thomas dated April 21, 1994, signed by Senators Max Baucus, Larry Pressler, Tom Daschle and Larry Craig, requesting that the proposed rules be withdrawn. I understand from Bob Cranston, ALAA Secretary, that a similar letter to Mr. Thomas was sent bearing the signatures of a number of members of the U.S. House of Representatives.

Of course, we will want to review the revised rules when they are published. However, the U.S. Forest Service has now publically stated that the revised rules will allow rockhounding activities to continue on lands administered by the U.S. Forest Service without a permit. This happy outcome reassures us that the Federal Government, in general, and the rule making process, in particular, can be responsive to our concerns when we voice those concerns in an appropriate manner. All who worked to advise AFMS members of the rule changes proposed by the Forest Service and those who contacted the U.S. Forest Service to express their views are to be congratulated.

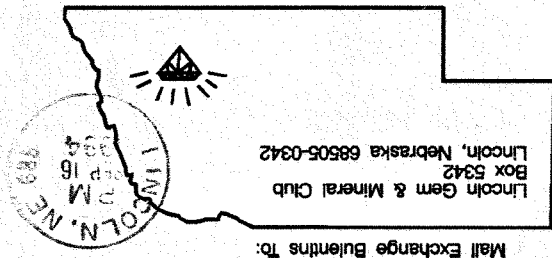
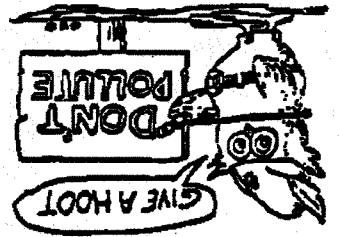

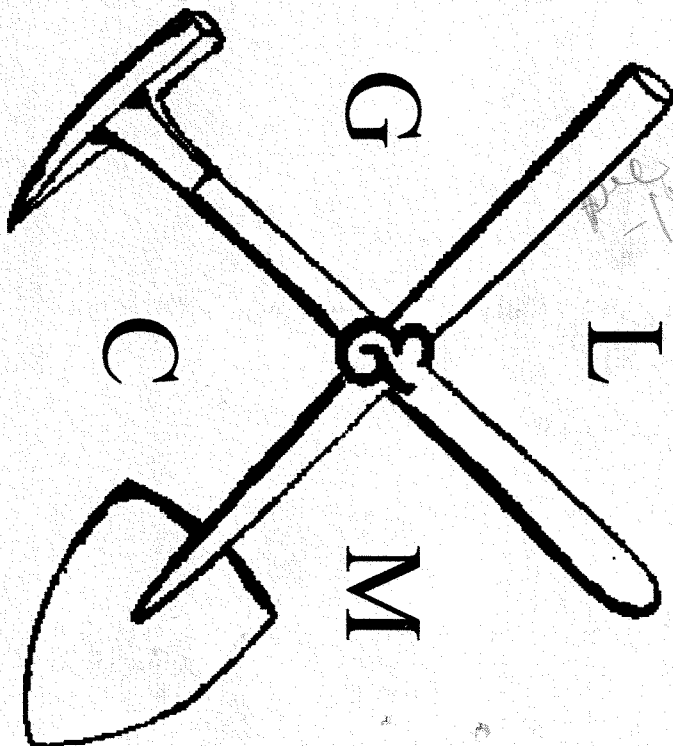
