DID YOU KNOW?

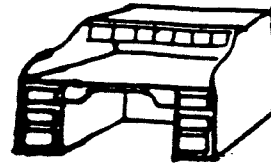
GEORGE WASHINGTON wore a gold ring with a lock of his own hair set in glass? The glass was framed in red, white and blue enamel set with 13 pearls.

Clipped from 'Pegmatite', September 1999, with the questions on Page 4--

ANSWERS TO THE PALEONTOLOGICAL QUIZ

1. Albertosaurus, at 30 ft. in length. Only Tyrannosaurus was larger, at about 50 ft. Allosaurus: large Jurassic meat eater. Tenontosaurus: Early Cretaceous herbivore.
2. False. All of the ammonites died out with the dinosaurs, but belemnites held on until the Eocene. And, of course, *Nautilus* made it to modern times.
3. K/T means "Cretaceous/Tertiary", generally referring to the boundary between the Paleocene Epoch and the latest Cretaceous Epoch. (K was used for Cretaceous, since C had already been used for Carboniferous.)
4. Whales show up in the fossil record during the Eocene Epoch. At the end of the Cretaceous, with the large extinctions, large niches were left in the ocean from the demise of the large marine lizards. Through the Paleocene and into the Eocene, carnivore mammals slowly moved back into the ocean and filled the vacant niches.
5. False. Brachiopods are not clams, they are a totally different phylum. During the Paleozoic, brachiopods were common, but clams weren't. There was a massive extinction at the end of the Paleozoic, most brachiopods died out, bivalves took over.
6. Pentremites is an invertebrate animal related to crinoids, starfish, and sea urchins. *Neuropteris* was a Paleozoic tree fern, *Pinus* is a pine, and *Sequoia* is the redwood.
7. Grass is first known from the Miocene. Prior to this, there were only weeds. Also, without grass, there were no grazers, just browsers.
8. False. Mastodons were mammals, a type of extinct elephant that reached their peak about 10,000 years ago during the last Ice Age.
9. Mosasaurs were lizards, and their nearest living relative is the monitor lizard. Like the whales of the Tertiary, the mosasaurs were a land form that returned to the sea.
10. False. Trilobites became extinct at the end of the Paleozoic.
11. There is no set date for declaring something a fossil. Some paleontologists think that a fossil should represent an extinct species and date from at least the Pleistocene.
12. Spiders are first found in the Silurian, and are one of the earlier known land dwellers.
13. True. The teeth of the modern sand shark *Carcharias taurus* are indistinguishable from those of its 58 million year old ancestors.
14. Camels are first found in the fossil record in North America (Great Plains of the U.S.)
