We will have one last general meeting before our show to talk about the final plans. Please attend this meeting on March 16 to determine where your

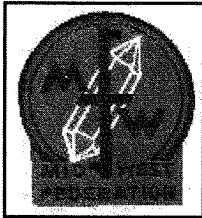
talents can best be put to use. Pat will have a great program following the meeting. We will see you there.

## Midwest Federation News

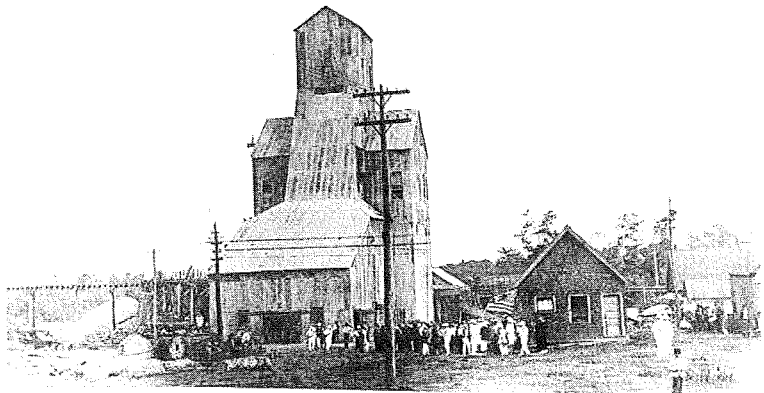

# MR BONES

**M**any shrieks were heard over the weekend as an 18-foot prehistoric creature tried to sink its teeth into small children enjoying the Tumbleweed Festival.

This primitive beast was no monster, but rather a "friendly" foam Tyrannosaurus Rex puppet operated by Tim Seeber. The Denver man was entertaining crowds at his first Tumbleweed Festival.

"This is a baby T-Rex, Mr. Bones," Seeber introduced. "And I am a paleopuppeteer."

Seeber inched his big dinosaur a few feet from unsuspecting kids roaming the lawn of the Lee Richardson Zoo, trying to bite down on the screaming youth with his puppet's foam teeth.

Mr. Bones isn't hard to spot in a crowd. His personalized license plate and 3-foot spiked tail draw immediate attention from behind. Not to mention from the front, where his huge mouth and retracting jaw show rows of pointed teeth.

Mr. Bones is constructed out of foam, recycled aluminum, cardboard and paper maché. Seeber said he copied the bone structures from the Denver Museum from authentic dinosaur bones, simplifying them and creating them out of cardboard.

First, Seeber gets under the puppet, near the hips, and then supports and maneuvers it with his waist and shoulders. Mr. Bones' legs and head move, including a working jaw for "eating" youngsters.

"Doing this is like theater, except you get to be in the audience," Seeber said. "It's actually pretty educational and kids learn by mistake by asking questions, like what is he made of, or dinosaur questions. So really, the dinosaur is the hook, then they ask other questions."

For the past six years, Seeber has been performing with Mr. Bones at festivals and school programs. He said he got the idea for Mr. Bones after he needed a Halloween costume several years ago.

Seeber has an art degree and a science and theater background, which he said fits perfectly with operating Mr. Bones. He said he has a group of dinosaur puppets besides Mr. Bones.

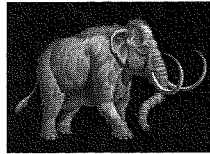
"I'm really into archeology, and always into theater, not that I'm good on stage, but now I go into the technical side," he joked. "I love to be in the audience making people smile. There are thousands of smiles per day, not to mention I eat 1,000 kids a day."

Seeber said he gets a kick when children talk to him while he's under Mr. Bones, operating it, and then treats the dinosaur like it's alive.

"Oh, they like to come up and ask if they can pet him, asking if he's friendly," he said. "I have to be very slow and cautious when I'm puppeteering him. When I play with these kids, I can't be aggressive because you can really scare them."

Mostly, though, he said their screams are generated from being excited and having fun, not from fear.

"I really suffer through my work," Seeber said of the exercise puppeteering Mr. Bones brings. "But, some say, "oh, gee, I have to go to work," while I say, oh, I'm not going to work?"



## Prehistoric Nebraska

**N**ebbraska's state fossil March 1, 1967 was a very special day for both Nebraska and fossil fans. On its 100th birthday, the state that gave us Arbor Day became the first state to adopt an official fossil. Nebraskans chose the mammoth.

It has been estimated that the remains of no fewer than ten mammoths lie buried in an average square mile of Nebraska landscape. The University of Nebraska State Museum has the remains of mammoths and mastodons from at least 84 of Nebraska's 93 counties. Bones and tusks have been found just one block from the Museum's Elephant Hall, and mammoth remains were even uncovered during the digging of a basement for a Museum paleontologist!

Ironically, the most famous mammoth fossil site in the Great Plains is near Hot Springs, near South Dakota's Black Hills and just across the Nebraska border. More than 26,000 years ago, numerous Columbian mammoths were trapped and died in a spring-fed pond.

The most common mammoths in Nebraska were the Imperial mammoth, Columbian mammoth, and woolly mammoth. The Imperial mammoth was the largest. A specimen discovered in Nebraska's Lincoln County in 1922 may be the world's largest elephant. Nicknamed Archie, its skeleton can be seen today in Elephant Hall in the University of Nebraska State Museum in Lincoln. It stands fourteen feet high at the shoulder — and it was still growing when it died! Archie is estimated to have weighed nearly fifteen tons.

The largest known land mammal of all time was a hornless rhinoceros that lived in Asia during the Oligocene Period. But Archie was probably the largest land animal during the Ice Age.

Life on the Nebraska plains during the Ice Age would have been exciting! Since little of Nebraska was actually covered by glaciers, the land probably looked much as it does today.

But there was a far greater diversity of large mammals than today. Bones tell us that mountain sheep inhabited Great Plains highlands, including Scottsbluff. Vultures larger than today's California condor soared over the plains, searching for dead mammoths, bison, and other large animals. Some had been killed by saber-toothed cats or other predators. But others had simply died from disease, starvation, or accidents.

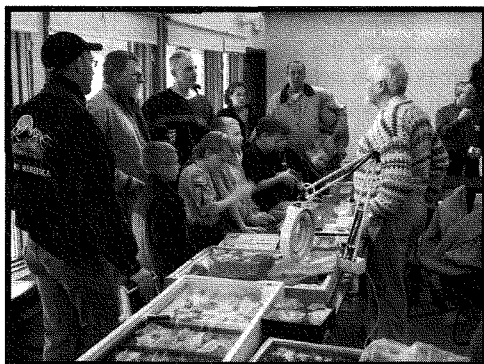
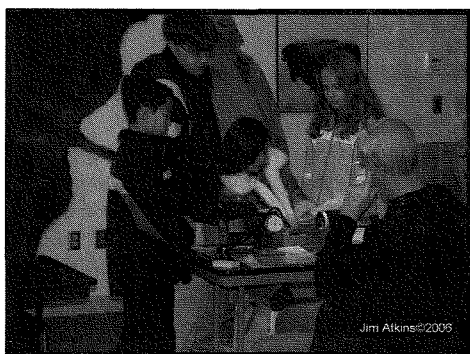
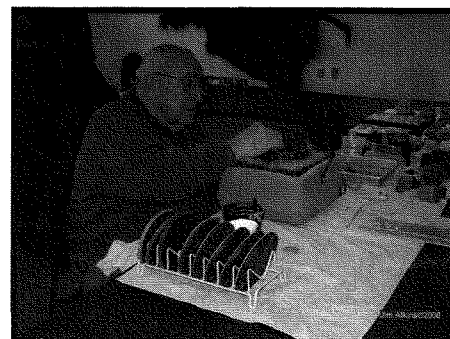
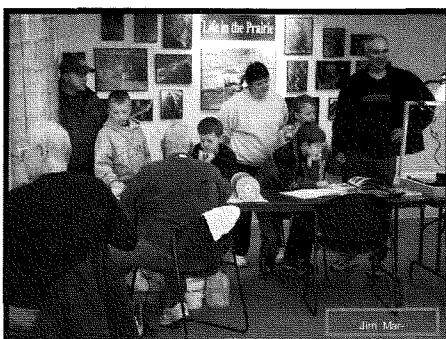
Vast flocks of waterfowl may have fed and nested near lakes created by melting glaciers. Beavers thrived where prairie dogs live today.

Towards the end of the Pleistocene, Nebraska's mammoths diminished, while bison herds grew larger. Did bison prefer the new climate, or was it simply the change in vegetation that encouraged them? About 12,000 years ago, mammoths became extinct in Nebraska.

Some scientists wonder if people hunted mammoths to extinction. Perhaps a changing climate doomed mammoths and mastodons to extinction anyway, and humans simply hurried them on their way.

Geology Day was held at Pioneer Park at the Nature Center on February 12, 2006 between 1 and 4 PM.

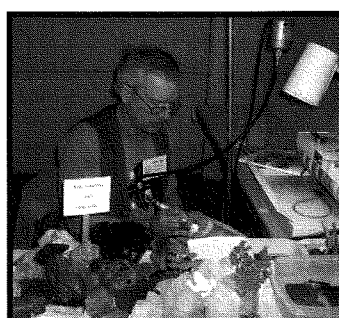
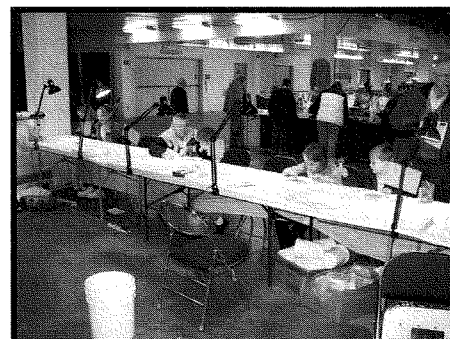
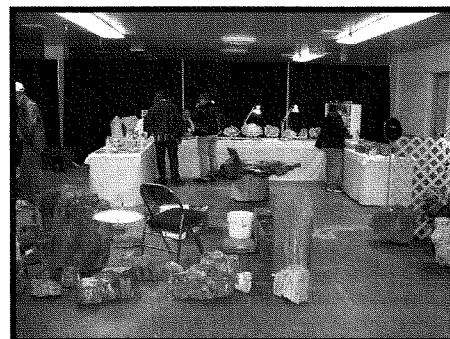
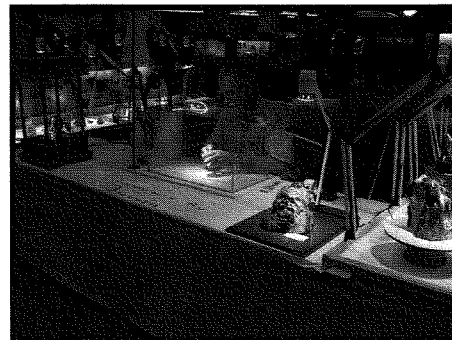
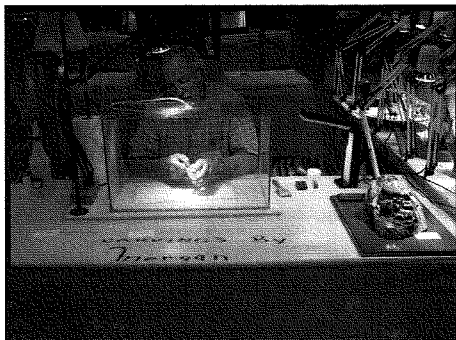
The event was well attended by 90 visitors. They were very interested and asked many questions as well as bringing rocks to be identified.
