2007 Crawford Field Trip

Jim and I left home on June 30 to begin the long trek to Crawford, Nebraska, specifically Fort Robinson State Park. We decided to take a route different from any we'd taken before, heading out to Ogallala, then northwest toward Bridgeport. I had never been to see Chimney Rock or Scottsbluff, so this was a treat for me. We pulled into the campground at Fort Robinson around 3:30 in the afternoon where we met up with Ed Dvorak. We were able to obtain side-by-side camping spaces so Ed could keep an eye on us. Unfortunately, a series of unforeseen events and the midweek holiday made it impossible for the Denver Guild members to join us as planned. In the event that anyone made it to Toadstool Park with hopes of joining us, we posted a note there with instructions on how to find us.

For me, this was the perfect field trip: rock collecting, fellowship with friends, and fishing! The first evening, Jim and I decided to take it easy after a full day of travel by checking out Carter P. Johnson Lake located on the Fort. We tossed in our lines and caught several small bass, which we released. I was goofing off with a lure I'd never caught anything with (green spoon with red dots) when I got a big strike. After struggling with what felt to be a log, a four pound catfish surfaced. I couldn't believe my eyes! (By the way, it was very tasty!)

Sunday found us searching for Fairburns, prairie agates, and whatever else took our fancy. Although no Fairburns were discovered, we found lots of other pretties. The day was beautiful, although a little warm with thunderheads building.

Monday was another warm day, spent hunting petrified wood in the area Terry Anderson showed us two years ago. We found lots of small pieces. From this location, we drove north about a half mile. Here we found fist-sized and larger pieces. Ed spotted an area about 50x50 feet that had lots of larger pieces. A short distance away, Jim found two, nice-sized petrified logs. On the way back to camp, we made a side trip to the Hudson-Meng bison bonebed to see the fossil beds. It was interesting and educational.

That evening, Crawford and Chadron had severe thunderstorm warnings, although Fort Robinson missed the worst of it. We had rain, thunder and lightning, but no wind.

We teased Ed about his collecting method. He would claim to be heading off to a distant location in order to collect rocks on his way back to the truck, so he wouldn't have to carry the heavy bucket so far. But there he would be, loading up his bucket with rocks, not 50 feet from the truck. Needless to say, Ed got lots of exercise toting heavy buckets.

Tuesday, in order to beat the heat, we got up at daybreak and drove to Pasture 22A to collect blue agate and pseudomorphs. The day started out with distant clouds and fairly cool. By the time we got to the collection area, we looked around and a big, black wall of very low clouds was heading straight at us. The wind was strong

and cold. Ahhhh, what a relief from the heat. We've wondered what it was like for The Weather Channel correspondents reporting on hurricanes. Well, now we know. The standard joke about "the wind stopped blowing in Nebraska and everyone fell down" applies here. If the wind had suddenly stopped, we would have been face down on the ground. Other than a few little sprinkles, we missed the rain. By noon, the storm had cleared out but the temperature stayed cool, so it was a great day for collecting. Once we removed all the good pieces of blue agate and pseudomorphs, we headed back to the petrified wood area. More collecting, then back to camp. This evening, Jim and I made our final fishing trip to Carter P. Johnson Lake. Jim caught a very nice trout, about 1½ pounds. I tried my silly little red polka-dotted spoon again and caught another catfish, this one about two pounds. Once the fish were cleaned, we spent the evening hunkered around the campfire, sharing stories and gloating over all the great rocks we found.

The trip home was as much fun as the trip going. We took yet another route home, this one taking us past the awesome and fun Carhenge at Alliance, Nebraska, and as seen on the CBS Sunday Morning show. If you like cars, you must see this tribute to modern transportation.

Jim and I came home with about three hundred pounds of cutting/tumbling material, and Ed took home about the same amount. The trip was a lot of fun and worth the time and fuel.

July 21, 2007 dawned bright and hot. The Marburger's headed down to Odell, Nebraska to meet up with members of the Central Iowa Mineral Society and LGMC members. The designated meeting location was Diamond Head Wildlife Management Area, just west of Odell.

There we met up with three Iowa club members, and Ed Dvorak, Ed Ridge, Annette Gifford, and Charles and Kathy Meisinger of LGMC. We marched the half mile trek to the Odell Diamond (barite crystals) collecting area. Jim had obtained permission to hunt on private land, and we also hunted on state land. Once we knew what to look for, everyone found "diamonds". A few rosettes were found in addition to individual crystals.

The Iowa people found a sufficient quantity of the unique, Odell diamonds that they planned to share them with all their club members.

The day was very warm, so after a couple of hours, we headed back to the vehicles and proceeded to a road cut on Highway 8 that is known to have fossils, minerals, and geodes. Several fossils and geodes were found at this location, along with two individual double terminated quartz crystals.

After hunting and collecting there for about an hour, we went to the next site, a road cut on Highway 112. A few more fossil and geode specimens were found here. Everyone was hot and tired by now, so we all went our separate ways. All in all, another successful trip. The Iowa people were quite thrilled with their finds.

MWF DELEGATES MEETING

August 11, 2007

Meeting called to order by First Vice President, Pam Hecht. President Eric Peterson was unable to attend for health reasons. Past Presidents were introduced.

AFMS President, Dr. Robert Carlson was introduced.

Names of persons who have passed during the last year were read. Of particular note for LGMC was the reading of Bill White's name.

Rules of order were established.

Minutes were approved.

The Treasurers report was approved.

The 2008 Budget was approved.

State Directors and Assistants were introduced. Written reports were made available.

REPORTS OF PERMANENT COMMITTEES:

Archeology: not present (the purpose of this committee is to share archeological news and information via the Newsletter).

Bulletin Aids: not present

Cancelled Stamps: not present (they make bookmarks and pins out of cancelled stamps to sell to increase funds in the Endowment Fund)

Convention/Shows: not present

Credentials: Election ballots are in the mail. They need to be returned by September 30. (They make sure that everyone gets signed in and officers elected)

Director of Supplies: Maintains supplies of literature and Directories which can be ordered through the web site.

Directory: John Blue, The Treasurer sends him the information shortly after dues are due after the first of January each year.

Education: vacant This person reviews books etc. for educational information to share via the Newsletter.

Endowment Fund: A jug was passed around for everyone to put change into, currently there is over \$77,000.00 in the Endowment Fund.

Environment/Legislation: Dean Stone reported on the American Land Access Association (ALAA). Their purpose is to keep roads and trails open for public (rockhounds) access. There was much discussion regarding mining in Michigan from a pro mining perspective.

Insurance: no report.

Junior Activities: Michelle Yamanaka reported has written numerous articles providing content for Junior Leaders. The many articles she has published in the AMFS Newsletter are free to be duplicated as long as you attribute them to her.

Lapidary Arts: currently vacant. This person would research, write articles for the Newsletter, promote displays and competition.

Long Range Planning: This consists of the 3 past Presidents who look at problems and make find solutions. John Washburn reported they are completing a generic release form to be used by Field Trip Chairpersons to help gain access from Quarry owners. He suggested pointing out to quarry owners possible tax write offs that could be gained by allowing access. He suggested we look at posting field trip information on the MWF website to share with other clubs. A Wisconsin delegate suggested that participant take an OSHA test for quarry safety prior to entering.

Geology: Judy Washburn has been keeping track of new discoveries and events such as the new discovery of a petrified forest south of Danville, Illinois.

Membership: This committee promotes new clubs to join MWF.

Merit Awards: The form for submitting the club for this award is in the Newsletter.

Micromounts: There will be a symposium on micromounts in Cleveland, Ohio November 2-4, 2007.

Mineralogy: Scott Thieben, a former professor of Mineralogy at Iowa State University is the chair. (he is a regular dealer at our show).

Newsletter: Ellen from the Wisconsin Geological Society will be the new editor. Her e-mail address is ERD@MSN.COM"

Paleontology: no report

Program Library Development: Marge Collins will be stepping down soon after many years. She stressed we need new programs and encouraged members to give it a try.

Program Requests: John Blue discussed the need to digitalize the programs. Steve Shimatzki suggested that program chairs digitalize them when they get them. Marge Collins requested feedback on which programs to focus on digitalizing.

Publications: Review, update and develop new publications.

Public Image: New MWF trifolds are being developed.

Safety and Field Trips: Promoting an Outdoor Code of Ethics was discussed. Steve Shimatzki recommended sharing a Google calendar for field trips.

Scholarships: no report

Silent Auction: A silent auction was held during the convention to support the Endowment Fund.

Uniform Rules: Joyce Hanschu is responsible for following and initiating changes in AMFS rules. There was only one case submitted for the show this year. We need to encourage participation in the display case competition.

Web site: The site will be revamped in the next few months.

Parliamentarian: this is a source of information to appeal to for questions or situations.

SPECIAL COMMITTEES:

Rockhound Appreciation Award: Send in a nominating paragraph to Fran Gutkowski. (remind me I have a recommendation)

Boundaries: No disputed this year.

Officers and Directors Code of Ethics: There is no specific requirement that we have one, but one is being developed. Dean Stone informed us that there will be a letter sent out to the clubs requiring small organizations to file with the IRS. 5013-C organizations can not promote any political campaign.

CONVENTION REPORTS:

2008, Lincoln, Nebraska, Roger Pabian reported the show will be June 20-22, 2008 at the Pershing Auditorium. It will be held in conjunction with the Nebraska State Show and the 50th Anniversary Show for the Lincoln Gem and Mineral Club. There are about five field trips being planned. There will be opportunities to search for "Odell Diamonds" (barite crystals), fossils (Permian, Cretaceous, and Pleistocene age), various minerals, and lapidary specimens. The field trips will occur during the week prior to the Convention/Show. Special features will include Native American Petroglyphs and Geologic Features from the Lewis and Clark Voyage of Discovery among others.

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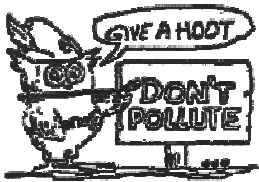
